❖ Program and Course Requirements

Theme

The twenty-first century brings all sorts of challenges, some of which we have seen before, others of which are new. In nearly every corner of the world, there has been a tidal wave, of sorts, of change which has upended the previous consensus. Politics, the economy, the digital world, and the environment are particular topics which impact all of us to varying degrees. The 2026 International Summer School of Theology will explore what the Reformed tradition, in particular, has to offer the world in seeking to navigate these topics. We will address the historical contexts, and how the Reformed tradition has dealt with similar questions in the past; our contemporary challenge; and how we might look to the future and the faith we pass down. The Reformed tradition has, since its beginning, been in dialogue with (and has sometimes challenged) the social order, and the summer school will continue in this vein. We will explore questions of politics—for example: democracy, autocracy, sovereignty of nation-states and the fusion of religion and politics; questions of economy—for example: capitalism, socialism, economic inequality especially the concentration of wealth; questions regarding the digital world—for example: the rise of artificial intelligence, the continuing evolution of social media, deepfakes, and more; questions regarding the environment—for example: the climate crisis, common good and individual good, and so much more for all of these. Scholars and students from around the world will gather to offer unique perspectives on each of these so that students will be able to gain a more global perspective on these challenges.

Program

About fourteen sessions of 90 minutes will be held from Monday evening July 6 till Friday July 10, extended with one optional meeting on Sunday July 9 (visit of a church service). During these days full time presence is required. This includes one excursion, sharing in meals (lunch and dinners) and some additional activities.

There will be a photographer present to take pictures for IRTI. If you wish to not be photographed, please tell Joost, Maarten or Brecht.

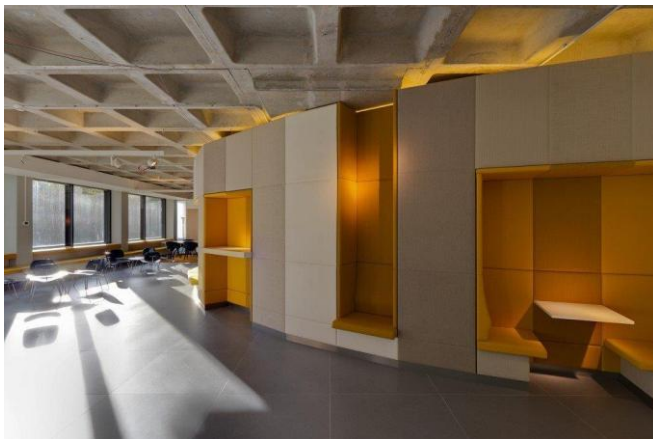

❖ Lunch, Dinner and Refreshments

The summer school programme has arranged lunch and dinner from Monday night onwards.

Both lunch and dinner will normally be served at the VU university restaurant. Upon arrival you'll receive vouchers, which can be used to purchase your own lunch and dinner. The university restaurant offers a wide variety of lunch and dinner options, including drinks and salads. The vouchers' value is €7,50 (Lunch) or €10 (dinner). We kindly request to pay any additional costs in the VU restaurant yourself (cash – no banknotes of more than € 100 – or debit card – no credit card). **We kindly ask you to return vouchers you did not need or are left over.** Note that on Wednesday evening, dinner will be served in a restaurant in Utrecht.

Refreshments including coffee and tea will be served during breaks in the main area of the PThU.



❖ Directions and Public Transportation

Upon arrival all international participants will receive a public transportation card of the GVB which can be used to travel in Amsterdam by metro, tram and bus (trains are excluded!). These tickets can be used from Monday to Friday onwards. Make sure to always check in and out when entering or leaving a tram, metro or bus.

Venue

The Summer School opening and lectures will be held at the Free University (Vrije Universiteit) in Amsterdam. The VU University can be found at De Boelelaan 1105 in Amsterdam.

All lectures will take place in HG 15A37 (15th floor of the VU building) and the *Kerkzaal* (16th floor of the VU building).



To get from any airport (Eindhoven, Rotterdam or Schiphol) to the VU, we recommend taking a train to 'Amsterdam Zuid'. From this station, it is a 10-minute walk to the VU main building. Exit the station heading south and walk through Amsterdam's financial district to the VU. Follow the 'Claude Debussy' street (without cars) and take a left at the main road. The big building on your right is the VU University.

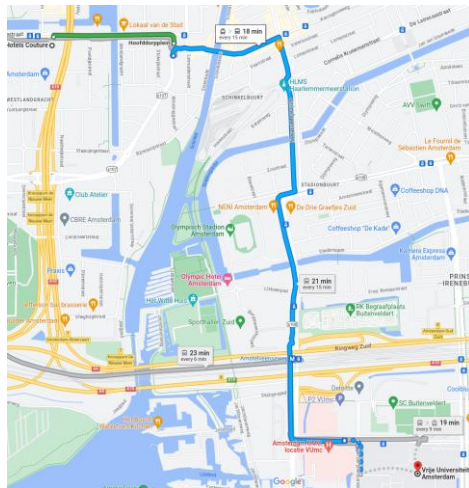

Public Transportation

You can easily reach the PThU by public transport. Tram and metro stops are in close proximity to the hotel.

The closest station is: Amsterdam, Delflandlaan. From here, you can take tramline 2 in the direction of Centraal Station and get off at Hoofddorpplein. From there, you can take busline 62 in the direction of Amstelstation and get off at Amsterdam, VUmc.

In total, the trip should take around 20-25 minutes



Tram line 2 to the centre of Amsterdam:

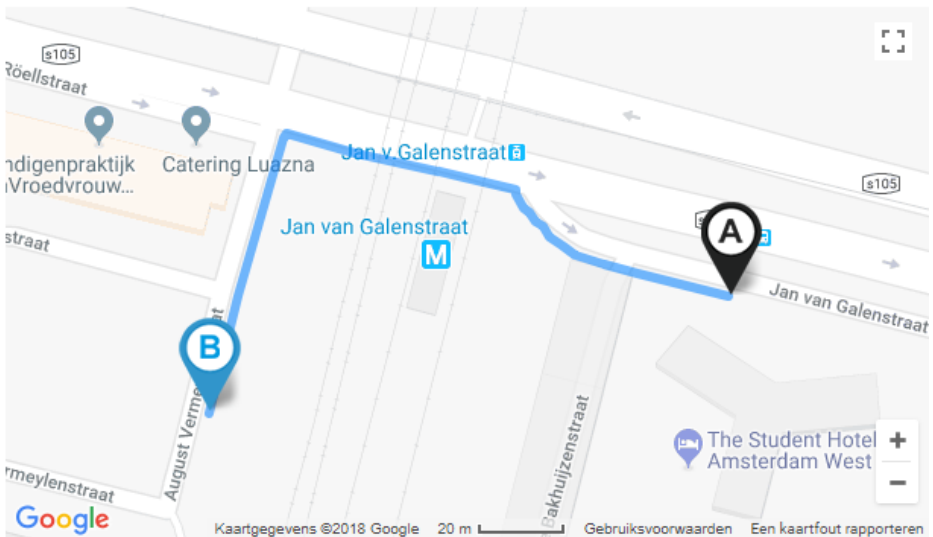
Tram 2 goes directly to the city center to the Museum Square, Leidse Square the Dam and all the way to Amsterdam Central station

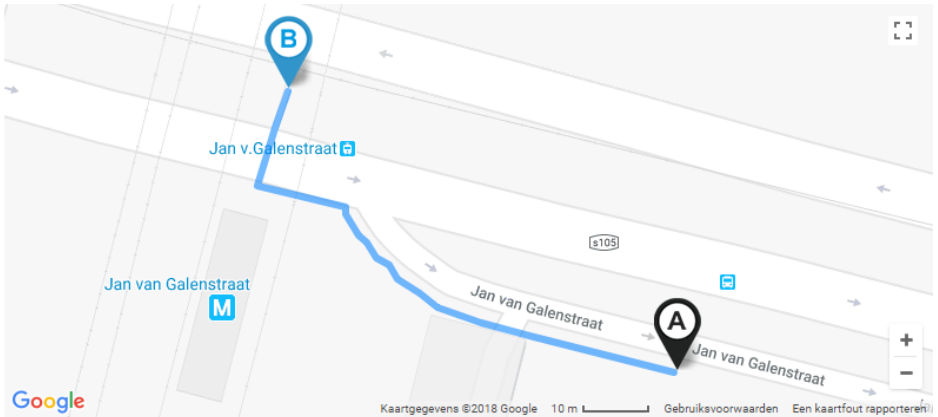


A: The Social Hub

Discover Amsterdam and take a look @ The Nine Streets



While many visitors head straight to the busy chain-store mecca of Kalverstraat, those in the know get their retail therapy at one of the city's more locally flavoured shopping meccas. The most well-known of these is De Negen Straatjes or 'The Nine Streets', a quaint warren of cobbled streets that connect the main canals between Leidsegracht and Raadhuisstraat. Here you'll find over 200 retailers, including a fine selection of independent boutiques, vintage shops and specialty stores selling everything from designer dresses to handmade cosmetics. You'll find a similar shopping experience with less crowds on the hip Haarlemmerdijk, the Utrechtsestraat, or the delightful Czaar Peterstraat in Amsterdam East.

Alternative tip: If you're looking for souvenirs to take home, skip the tourist traps and shop for authentic Dutch design and quality Amsterdam brands at the Local Goods Market in De Hallen or the I Amsterdam Store in Central Station.
